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
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Arab Peninsula Fertile crescent North Africa

CAN in pre-Islamic era in Arabia

- Lawless land
- Uncountable marriages
- Slavery
- Constant wars
- No inheritance for women
- Children as fathers' property
- Infanticide was widespread

Infanticide

Pre-Islamic Arabia practiced infanticide

- Out of poverty (males and females).
- As sacrifices to gods, or
- As disappointment and social disgrace felt by a father upon the birth of a girl.

Infanticide & Islam

- was regarded as a grave sin
- implicitly denounced in the story of Pharaoh's slaughter of the male children of Israelites
- Qur'an "when the girl-infant that was buried alive is asked: for what sin she was killed"

The right for survival

 When if one of them receiveth tidings of the birth of a female, his face remaineth darkened, and he is wroth inwardly. (58) He hideth himself from the folk because of the evil of that whereof he hath had tidings, (asking himself): Shall he keep it in contempt, or bury it beneath the dust. Verily evil is their judgment. (The Bees, 59)

Corporal Punishment

- Widely used at home and schools
- Research is limited
- No laws banning CP

FGM

- FGM in North Africa + Arab peninsula
- Muslims and Christians
- 50-85% of females in Egypt/ Sudan
- "There is no single verse in the Quran that relates explicitly or implicitly to female circumcision".

Al-Azhar Al-Sharif, 2009

FGM

- Nawal El-Saadawi, a writer MD victim of FGM, stated:
- "The <u>importance given to virginity</u> and <u>an</u> <u>intact hymen</u> in these societies is the reason why female circumcision still remains a very widespread practicebehind circumcision lies the belief that, <u>by removing parts of girls'</u> <u>external genitals organs, sexual desire is</u> <u>minimized. "</u>

Early Marriages

- In Yemen early marriage is a custom (50% below 18)
- Reference to early marriage can be found no where in Quran
- Recent scholars' research: The prophet marriage to Aysha at 18 & not 9.

Religion

- Misinterpretation or misuse of religious texts.
- Nothing in Quran advocates spanking a child.
- Attributing a single Hadith to PM
- "spank kids at 9 when they refuse to pray".
- Countless hadiths preaches the opposite.

- Extrinsic religious orientation is linked with increased risk of CPA.
- Intrinsic religiosity orientation is linked with reduced risk of CPA

Orphans in Quran

The Qur'an in 19 verses

- forbids harsh and oppressive treatment of orphan's children while
- urging kindness and justice towards them.
- reprimand those who do not honor the orphans and encourage feeding them.

Orphans in Quran

 The Qur'an speaks of the reward waiting for those who feed orphans, poor and the prisoner for the love of God (<u>76:8-9</u>). It also warns those who wrongfully consume the property of orphans that they will be punished for this sin.

Do not betray the trust!

 "Come not near the wealth of the orphan save with that which is better till he come to strength; and keep the covenant. Verily, the covenant it will be questioned." (Night journey, verse 34)

Breast-feeding

 "Mothers shall suckle their children for two whole years; (that is) for those who wish to complete the suckling". Al-baqara-233

Prophet Mohammed (PM) Hadiths (sayings)

• "It is a grave sin for one to neglect a person whom he is responsible for sustaining". PM

• "Each of you is a shepherd and each of you is accountable for his or her flock" PM

PM

"Honor your children and give them good names"

"He is not one of us who does not show mercy to youngster"

Aysha: Mohammed never hit a child or a servant or a woman.

The rule of harm prevention

- "Their should be neither harming nor reciprocating harm" PM
- Nondiscrimination:
 - "Fear god and be fair to your children" PM
 - Humans are equal just like the teeth of the comb".
 PM

Discipline

- "Nothing a parent may award to his child is better than a good upbringing". PM
- May god have mercy on a parent who helps his (or her) child be grateful and kind to him (or her). PM
- "With the child, play for seven, discipline for seven, accompany for seven and then let go to lead his/her own life". PM

The Right for Education

"The seeking of knowledge is an obligatory on every Muslim". PM

"Teach your children differently from your style, they are created for a time different from yours"

Forbidding Incest

Alnisa Sura - verse 23

Forbidden unto you are your mothers, and your daughters, and your sisters, and your father's sisters, and your mother's sisters, and your brother's daughters and your sister's daughters, and your foster-mothers, and your foster-sisters, and your mothers-in-law, and your stepdaughters who are under your protection (born) of your women unto whom ye have gone in but if ye have not gone in unto them, then it is no sin for you (to marry their daughters) - and the wives of your sons who (spring) from your own loins. And (it is forbidden unto you) that ye should have two sisters together, except what hath already happened (of that nature) in the past. Lo! Allah is ever Forgiving, Merciful. (23)

- Nothing in Quran or sunna allows corporal punishment of children.
- "It is not permissible to incur harm, no parent (or teacher or employer) has the right to smack a child; this would inevitably inflict psychological as well as physical damage". Al-Azhar, children in Islam, 2009.

Other challenges

- Culture of secrecy (no see, hear, talk)
- Privacy / girl's future!
- Protect the families from scandals rather than protect the child from abuse
- Policy of prof. silence (confidentiality): protect from accountability

Breaking silence

- "How could a victim of child sexual abuse forget the incidence?.... How could children forget the humiliation by adults?" Page 95.
- "Imagine waking up one morning and not remembering the humiliating comments by the family. Not remembering the sadistic school teacher who used to enjoy abusing me" Page 96. Gazi Al-Qosaibi memoir "Alzheimer" 2010
