A refugee is someone who "...owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion, is outside the country of his nationality, and is unable to or, owing to such fear, is unwilling to avail him/herself of the protection of that country."

- Constant Violence




Refugees have experienced...

 - Never-ending fear and frequent movement to hide or to be safe
 - Little or no education and disruption of productive lives







Refugee Camps

Many refugees have spent most of their lives in refugee camps where:

- Everything is scarce
- Safety is not guaranteed
 - Schools may not exist

Helps refugee children, youth, and parents acclimate to the U.S. school system by offering...







- The experience can be overwhelming




Imagine...
