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What is a UAC?



Definition (Homeland Security Act 2002):

- 18 years or younger
- Without lawful immigration status in the U.S.
- Without parent or legal guardian in the U.S.
- OR, with no parent or legal guardian in the U.S. available to provide care or legal custody

Unaccompanied Alien Child (UAC) is the legal term often used for children who are in the US without legal status, and without an available parent or legal guardian.

Many come to the US alone to reunify with family members, others are escaping poverty, hunger, violence and abuse in their communities or

Their journey to the US often involves negotiating identified. Some children with smugglers and riding do not have viable family on tops of trains. Many children go without food or water for several days. They often witness violent situations and are victims of violence themselves.

UACs are apprehended at the border or in communities by immigration officials and are put in the custody of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS), Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR), Division of Children's Services (DCS).

Once children are in federal custody they are placed in immigration proceedings and family reunification options are reunification options and are placed in federal foster care or return to their home country.



In FY12, the majority of UACs that ORR/ DCS served were between 14 and 17 years old. 77 percent were males and 23 percent were females.*
