Afghan Humanitarian Parolee (AHP) (arrived between 7/31/2021 and 9/30/2023)	 Citizens or nationals of Afghanistan who were granted humanitarian parole by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) in response to the rapid evacuation and relocation of Afghans under Operation Allies Refuge/Operation Allies Welcome. Citizens or nationals of Afghanistan who presented at the U.S/Mexico border and were paroled by either CBP or ICE under section 212(d)(5) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA). Arrived in the U.S. between 7/31//2021 – 9/30/2023 Note: States and grantees may continue to provide ORR benefits and services to Afghan Parolees whose initial period of parole expires while their application for re-parole, asylum, or adjustment of status are pending. Eligible Afghan parolees are those who: Are an ORR beneficiary, as of the day before their initial parole expiration date; and Have submitted, as of the day before their initial parole expiration date; A re-parole application prior to the expiration of the initial period of parole. An asylum application prior to the expiration of the initial period of parole; or An adjustment of status application prior to the expiration of the initial period of parole. An adjustment of status application prior to the expiration of the initial period of parole. Note: For Afghans who resided on a Safe Haven during OAW, their date of ORR eligibility is 10/1/2021 or the date they departed the safe haven (entered the community), whichever is later. For Afghans who did not reside on a safe haven during OAW their date of ORR eligibility is their date of U.S. arrival. 	Exception: If an Afghan was paroled into the U.S. after 9/30/2023, but they are the spouse, child, or parent/legal guardian of an AHP who arrived prior to 9/30/2023, they are also eligible for ORR and mainstream services.
